

About Indira Gandhi Government College, Tezu:

Indira Gandhi Govt. College, Tezu, established on 2nd October 1986, has been a model centre of higher learning and research in the eastern region of Arunachal Pradesh. Being a unique initiative in field of higher education, this institution aims to emerge as a vital educational hub devoted to both qualitative teaching and state-of-the-art research. In recognition to its multi-dimensional potentialities as well as academic achievements, NAAC has accredited our college with **B**+ grade in 2006 (Cycle-I) and **B**++ grade in 2016 (Cycle-II) and **B** Grade in 2024 (Cycle-III).

The college is recognized by UGC, New Delhi and affiliated to Rajiv Gandhi University, Doimukh, Itanagar. It offers 4 years Undergraduate programmes as per NEP 2020 guidelines (consisting of Eight semesters) in Arts, Commerce and Science in an intellectually vibrant as well as liberal, lively and competitive academic environment. Apart from classroom teaching, the college builds student skills in areas like scientific inquiry, problem-solving, analytical and communication skills, and workshop as well as seminar practices.

Initially the college started functioning in the building of the District Industries Centre (DIC) with only Humanities courses (Pass course) in 1986. It also started with 42 students and eight faculty members in five departments (Bachelors of Arts). The College was later shifted to an abandoned building of Navodaya Vidyalaya and finally to the present permanent site of 200 acres in 1995. It has been duly recognised by the UGC under section 2(F) and 12 (B) of the UGC Act. The college is permanently affiliated to Rajiv Gandhi University, Rono Hills Itanagar. Over the years the College experienced significant expansion both in terms of quality and quantity amidst formidable challenges in terms of infrastructural constraints. The Commerce stream was introduced in 2004. The Department of Education was introduced during the Session 2007-08. The Science stream was made effective from the session 2014-15, and presently all the major subjects are available to the students in all streams.

This institution has dedicated and well-qualified academic faculty who has been consistently fine-tuning the intellectual potential of brilliant students to bring laurels and achieve new heights of academic excellence. Ultimately the college is striving to equip and train the young minds with apposite intellectual and moral matrix for exploring and realizing their full potential to face the challenges of the new millennium.

ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION TO B.A/B.SC./B.COM I SEMESTER NEP(FOUR YEAR DEGREE COURSE)(AS PER RAJIV GANDHI UNIVERSITY GUIDELINES)

The minimum eligibility criteria for admission shall be as follows:

- 1. Admission to undergraduate (UG) courses shall be merit based (that is, based on marks scored in Class XII/10+2 Board/ qualifying examinations) or entrance based (that is, based on written/practical tests depending on the course selected by an aspiring student), as decided by the university.
- 2. The applicant shall have passed the Class XII/10+2/Intermediate examination of any Board /Council/University examination in India or in any foreign country recognized as equivalent to the 10+2 system by the Association of Indian Universities (AIU).
 - i. **For Bachelor in Science (B.SC):** The students passed Class XII/10+2/Intermediate examination in Science stream shall be eligible.
 - ii. For Bachelor in Arts (B.A.) /Bachelor in Commerce (B.COM.): The students passed Class XII/10+2/Intermediate examination in any stream including equivalent vocational courses shall be eligible. For joining Commerce Stream, students shall have Commerce/Mathematics/Economics/Statistics as one of the subjects at Class XII/+2/Intermediate and having passed shall be considered.
- 3. The applicant shall have passed individually in each subject required (including practical papers if any) for calculating merit and eligibility to the course they seek admission in.
- 4. Applicants with gap year (s) shall not be at any disadvantage for the purpose of admission to undergraduate courses.
- 5. Reservations and relaxation for Scheduled Caste (SC) /Scheduled Tribe (ST) / Other Backward Classes-Non-Creamy Layer (OBC-NCL)/Economically Weaker Sections (EWS)/Children or



Widows of Personnel of the Armed Forces including Para Military /Kashmir Migrants and other categories shall be as per the Government Rules , which shall be applicable and acceptable from time to time by the University.

Note: It is mandatory that all students should have passed in AISSCE (10+2) or any other equivalent Examinations with 5 papers including English as a compulsory subject.

CATCHMENT AREA NORMS FOR ADMISSION

Catchment area norm was decided as per Govt. Order No.- ED / HE-104/86, Dated 18th July 1998, its revised No. ED/HE-52(Aca)/2011, Dated Itanagar the 27th October, 2016 under Agenda Item No. 9 conveyed vide U.O No. CABM/M-14/2016/4413 dated 24.11.2016 and the latest revised order under order No. HTE-17/7/2024 Dated Itanagar the 8th Aug 2024, students belonging to the following areas are eligible to get admission in this College:

- 1. B. A Lohit, Anjaw, Namsai Districts.
- 2. B. Com./ B. Sc Lohit, Anjaw, Namsai, Lower Dibang Valley, Dibang Valley, Longding and Changlang Districts.
- 3. However, students from neighbouring districts, viz., Lower Dibang Valley, Dibang Valley, Tirap, Longding and Changlang may seek admission under open Quota.
- **4.** Besides, they can seek admission having:
 - * B.A. (with Education as one of the Major subject)

Catchment Area Norms (one of the following criteria must be fulfilled):

- * Permanent residence should be in the catchment area (Necessary PRC must be submitted).
- * Students should pass from a school situated in the catchment area.
- * Parent should be an employee in the catchments area (*Certificate from the Employer should be submitted*).

RESERVATION FOR MERITORIOUS & DIFFERENTLY ABLED STUDENTS:

- Students getting 60% or higher in their Higher Secondary (10+2) Examination from outside the catchment area of our college, may be admitted.
- Number of seats reserved B A: 50, B.Com. –: 15 & B.Sc.: 10 seats. These seats will be filled up on first come first serve basis.
- Differently abled students will also get preference in admission (*Proper Certificate should be submitted*).

NOTE (FOR ALL CANDIDATES)

- 1. Candidates seeking admission must fill the online admission form carefully.
- 2. He / She should be present in person before the Verification Committee after selection.
- 3. Students from National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) are eligible for admission in this college.
- 4. Students who have appeared in CUET-2025 are eligible to apply. However, those who have not appeared in CUET-2025 are also directed to stay updated to the college website for further notification as per RGU guideline.
- 5. All students must have ACDEMIC BANK OF CREDIT (ABC) ID which is a mandatory requirement for filling up of forms for admission. For details one can log in the college website.

- 6. Original copy of all certificates must be brought for verification .
- 7. If any candidate fills in information, which is found incorrect and presumably intended to get admission fraudulently, his /her candidature will be summarily rejected. If detected later, admission will be cancelled without refund of any fees.
- 8. In 1st Semester, some seats are reserved for National level sportspersons, NCC cadets & NSS volunteers.

SUBJECT COMBINATIONS & COURSESTRUCTURE(NEP)

FOUR YEAR DEGREE COURSE AS PER NEP 2020 : FOR 2025-26 ACADEMIC SESSION

1.0 KEY POINTS:

- **UG Certificate:** Students exiting the programme after securing 40 credits will be awarded UG Certificate in the relevant discipline/subject provided they secure 4 credits in work-based vocational courses offered during the summer term or internship/apprenticeship in addition to 6 credits from skill-based courses earned during the first and second semester.
- UG Diploma: Students exiting the programme after securing 84 credits will be awarded UG Diploma in the relevant discipline/subject. Out of 84 credits, students will have to secure 4 credits in skill-based vocational courses offered during the first year or second year summer term.
- 3-year UG Degree: Students who wish to undergo a 3-year UG programme will be awarded UG Degree in the Major discipline after successful completion of three years, securing 120 credits.
- **4-year UG Degree (Honours):** A four-year UG Honours degree in the major discipline will be awarded to those who complete a four-year degree programme with 160 credits.
- 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research): A four year UG Degree in Honours with Research will be awarded to those Students who complete a four-year degree programme with 160 credits, including 12 credits from a research project/dissertation in the major discipline.

2.0 Other Key Criteria for UG Programme:

- Summer Internship/Apprenticeship: Summer internship/apprenticeship is mandatory for all the students taking major in any subject; UG certificate, UG Diploma, 3-year UG Degree, 4-year UG Degree (Honours), and 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research). However, for UG certificate it has to be completed during the summer break at the end of 2nd semester, for UG Diploma it has to be completed either during the summer break at the end 2st semester or 4th semester, and for others, it has to be mandatorily completed by the 5th semester. The students will select a vocational course for internship from the basket of vocational courses provided in the common structure.
- **Selection of Major course**: Students have to select any one major subject from BA/BSC/B.COM in the first semester and continue the same till the end of 2nd semester. All other students may continue with the same major till the end of four year degree course.



- Selection of Minor course: Students of any major subject will opt for minor courses from other majors. For example: Minor courses of Education will be offered to Non-Education Major Students.
- Selection of Multidisciplinary course: Students have to select a multidisciplinary course from the
 basket of multi-disciplinary courses provided in the common structure. Students are not allowed to
 choose or repeat courses or subjects already undergone at the Higher Secondary (Class-12)
 level.
- Selection of Compulsory Value-Added Course: Students have to select a compulsory Value-based course from the basket of value-based courses provided in the common structure.
- Research at UG Programme: Students who secure 75% marks and above in the first six semesters can undertake research at the undergraduate level/in the fourth year.
- For Honours students not undertaking Dissertation in VIII semester: Students who are not undertaking research project/dissertation work will have to do 3 courses of 12 credits in lieu of research project/dissertation.
- Multiple Entry and Exit: Exit and re-entry option in the Degree programme is allowed at 2nd Semester (first year) and 4th semester (second year) to those students who have awarded UG Certificate and UG Diploma, respectively. However, these students will be allowed to re-enter the degree programme within 3 years after their exit and will have to complete the degree programme within the stipulated maximum period of seven years.

SUBJECT COMBINATIONS & COURSESTRUCTURE(OLD)

CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS) : FOR STUDENTS SEEKING READMISSION

Rajiv Gandhi University has implemented the Choice Based Credit System for Under-Graduate Courses from the academic session 2021-22 vide its notification No. AC-1465/CBCS/2014 Dated 25th June 2021. The subject/ stream wise detailed Syllabus/course structure is available on the college website. The detailed course programme as per the above notification is as follows:

- 1.1 The CBCS programs shall include:
 - 1.1.1 Core Courses: A course which shall compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement is referred as a Core Course (CC). There shall be 14 papers under Core Course of 6 credits each.
 - 1.1.2 Elective Courses: Generally, a course which shall be chosen from a pool of courses and which shall be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course which shall include:
 - (A) Discipline Specific Elective Courses: Elective courses offered under the main discipline/subject of study are referred to as Discipline Specific Elective Course (DSE).
 - (i) There shall be at least 2 groups of DSE grouped as A and B, each containing a minimum of 04 (four) papers of 6 credits each (which may also include Project work/ Dissertation under group B).
 - (ii) The students will choose 2 papers each in 5th and 6th Semester from any one group which may include a Project work/ Dissertation. The total number of students pursuing Project work/ Dissertation may be limited to 1/3rd of the total admitted students in the core discipline decided on the basis of their performance (Sincerity, academic performance and laboratory proficiency).
 - (iii) Project work/Dissertation is to be offered as a special course involving application of knowledge in solving/ analyzing/ exploring a real-life situation/



- difficult problem. Students opting for such course shall work either independently or in a small group with an advisory support from a teacher/faculty member and submit a report at the end of the given semester in a standard format as decided by the College/University.
- (iv) The topic of the Project work/Dissertation which may be either field based or lab based, and requires supplement study/support study for gaining special/advanced knowledge in the core subject shall appropriately be chosen by the student(s) on advice of the teacher/faculty with due approval from the concerned Teacher in-charge in the College/Head of the Department in the University and a record of the same should be maintained. Due consideration to the choice of the students should be given keeping in view the faculties and expertise available in the College/University department.
- (B) Generic Elective Courses: An elective course of interdisciplinary nature chosen from an allied discipline/subject with an intention to provide exposure beyond the discipline of choice is referred as Generic Elective Courses (GEC). A core course of a particular discipline/subject may be offered as GE to the students of allied discipline/subject and vice versa. A maximum of two additional courses on Computer application may be offered by the College/University provided trained faculty and necessary infrastructural facilities are available.
 - (i) College/University shall offer those GEC for which proper infrastructure and resources are available.
 - (ii) Students shall choose 4 GEC, one in each semester from 1st to 4th semester, either exclusively from one particular discipline or 2 courses each from two subsidiary disciplines as enlisted below but in both the cases excluding his/her own discipline.

- (C) **Ability Enhancement Courses**: Ability Enhancement Courses shall be of two types and both mandatory for all disciplines.
 - (a) Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC)shall be the courses based upon the contents that led to knowledge enhancement and shall include courses on English, Hindi, MIL Communication, and Environmental Studies. There shall be separate courses for Environmental Studies for Arts, Science and Commerce disciplines.
 - (i) Students of BA/BSC/BCOM 1st Semester have to select one AECC course from English or Hindi, each of 4 credits as a compulsory course.
 - (b) **Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC):** The courses containing theoretical and/or lab/hands-on/ training/ field work components and designed to impart value-based and/or skill-based knowledge/life-skills to the students so as to increase their employability are referred as AEC. The students shall choose SEC from a pool of such prescribed courses, but only one course in a given semester, to fulfill a minimum requirement of 8 credits.
 - (i) Both in Science and Technology disciplines, SEC courses shall be of 2 credits each and be offered in 1st to 4th semesters, whereas in all other disciplines, the SEC shall be of 4 credits each and be offered in 3rd and 4th semesters. The colleges will offer these SEC depending on the availability of infrastructure and resources and may also fix the intake capacity in each SEC course.
 - (ii) The students of Science and Technology disciplines shall select at least 2 SEC of total 4 credit from his/her concerned discipline. For remaining 4 credits, he/she may select course(s) from either his/her own discipline or other under-graduate discipline of Science and Technology in the College/University. Further, in Science and Technology disciplines, SEC courses of 'Odd' and 'Even' semesters may be clubbed together wherever feasible so as to offer a wider choice to the students while selecting a particular course either to be pursued by him/her in 1st or 3rd semester and similarly for 2nd and 4th semester. In such situation, the College/University may conduct joint classes of that SEC as per their convenience during 'Odd' and 'Even' semesters.
 - (iii) The students of Arts and Commerce disciplines shall select 2 SEC, one each in III and IV Semesters from either his/her own discipline or other allied/cognate disciplines in order to fulfill the mandatory requirement of minimum 8 credits.



- 1.1.3 **Practical/Tutorial:** Practical/tutorials may be included as components in various Core Courses, DSE, GE, SEC and AEC.
- 1.1.4 **Choice of Elective Courses:** The college offers number of choices of elective courses (DSE, GE, SEC and AEC) for different disciplines as per availability of facility and infrastructure.

1.1.5 Accumulation of Credits:

The minimum and the maximum credit requirement of credits for the Undergraduate Course shall be 148 and 160 respectively

1.2 Accumulation of Additional Credits:

Students may pursue courses for additional 12 credits on their own from a pool of courses of 2/4 credits each as prescribed by the University under "Additional SEC" for accumulating extra credit to achieve the maximum permissible limit of 160 credits. Such prescribed "Additional SEC" may include courses related to Extra-Curricular Activities, General Interest and Hobby Courses, Sports, NCC, NSS, Vocational courses like Yoga and Physical Education; Food and Nutrition and Human Health; Computerized Accounting; Ecotourism Computer application and Web design; Tribal Studies etc. These courses may be offered to the students by the college provided facilities are available. The students may take one additional course in each semester from the second semester onwards, excluding those courses that have largely similar content and which they have already studied or have to study. Students may also pursue such relevant credit based online learning courses offered through SWAYAM platform. In case a student opts for a SWAYAM course, then, the university will assign credit to that course on the basis of the actual class work load of the course.

1.3 SWAYAM Courses:

The University shall allow up to 20% (varied as per the UGC instructions) of the total courses being offered in a particular program in a Semester through the online learning courses offered through SWAYAM platform provided the course content are alike. While making such decisions, the Academic Council shall, inter alia, consider allowing online courses of SWAYAM if:

- 1.3.1 There is non-availability of suitable teaching staff for running a course in the Institution, or
- 1.3.2 The facilities for offering the elective papers (courses), sought for by the students are not being offered by the University/College, but are available on the SWAYAM platform.
- 1.3.3 The courses offered on SWAYAM platform would supplement the teaching-learning process in the University.

All other terms and conditions of accepting SWAYAM courses shall be governed as per UGC (Credit Framework for Online Learning Courses through SWAYAM) Regulation, 2016 and any subsequent circular / notification/ amendments thereto.

2. Examination and Performance Evaluation:

Eligibility of a candidate to appear in examination and conduct of examination shall be governed by the relevant Ordinance(s) of the University. Briefly stated, there shall be two types of Examination: Internal Assessment and End Semester Examination.

- 2.1 **Internal Assessment**: **There shall be three internal assessment** tests of one hour duration conducted periodically for theoretical component of each course paper and one mid semester internal assessment test of one/two hours duration as necessitated for the practical components of each course paper.
 - 2.1.1 At least two of the three Internal Assessment tests shall be a written one. One of the three Internal Assessment tests may be conducted in the form of assignment like term paper, book review, group discussion, power-point presentation on a topic at the discretion of the course teacher. The average marks of two successfully cleared Internal Assessment tests shall be the final Internal Assessment score of the candidate in the theoretical component of that, the marks secured by the students upon successfully clearing shall be considered as final Internal Assessment score.

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- 2.1.2 In case a course paper is exclusively afield-based exercise, then the internal assessment shall be done by the concerned teacher/faculty of the basis of the performance of the students in the field and score awarded shall be considered as internal assessment score.
- 2.1.3 In case a course paper is entirely based on field work/lab work that are to be independently carried out by the student(s), then a mid-term evaluation of the Project Work in the form a seminar presentation by the concerned student(s) shall be done by duly nominated board of teacher/faculty from the concerned department of the College/University by the competent authority and the marks awarded there upon shall be considered as internal assessment score.
- 2.1.4 All students shall be subjected to the process of continuous evaluation and assessment. Accordingly, a student shall have to attend and duly pass in at least two Internal Assessment tests out of three tests, and End Semester Examination. The structure of these Internal Assessment Tests and End Semester Examinations shall be in 20%:80% ratio.
- 2.1.5 In order to qualify in the examination, a student has to secure a minimum of 35% marks in each course including at least two internal assessment tests and also the End semester examinations of each course with a minimum aggregate of 40% marks in order to be declared qualified in the examination of the respective semester.

IMPORTANT RULES AS PER UNIVERSITY ORDINANCE

Programme Registration:

- i. Migration Certificate is required to be submitted at the time of admission if students have passed their Class-XII Examination conducted by CBSE or any other Board / University from outside the State of Arunachal Pradesh. The students registered by the University as per the information provided by the Colleges/ Institutes shall be treated as final.
- ii. Gap Certificate in non judicial stamp paper duly signed by First Class Magistrate or the Lawyer must be submitted in original by those students who have passed their 10+2 in previous academic year.

Attendance: A Student has to secure 75 percent attendance in order to be eligible for the filling up the end semester Examination form.

Examination and Evaluation

- i. There shall be 20% marks for internal assessment and 80% marks for end semester examination in each course during every semester.
- ii. There shall be no provi<mark>sion for re-evaluation of the answer scripts of the end semes</mark>ter Examinations. However a candidate may apply for re-scrutiny.
- iii. Internal Assessment: The students shall be informed in advance about the nature of assessment. Students shall compulsorily attend in the process of internal assessment, failing which they will not be allowed to appear in the end semester examinations.
- iv. End Semester Examinations: There shall be one End semester examinations carrying 80 percent marks in each paper of a semester covering the entire syllabus prescribed for the course. The end semester examination is normally a Written/ Laboratory based examination/ Project work/ Dissertation as the case may be.
- v. The end semester examination for each course shall be of three hours duration.
- vi. Improvement Examination: A student shall be allowed to take the improvement examinations in any four theory courses of any of the six semesters after passing the six semester examination only once. In this case, the higher marks secured by the student shall be retained.
- vii. The candidates shall have to apply for improvement examination within one year or passing the Six Semester Examination.
- viii. No improvement shall be allowed in the practical examinations.
- ix. In each semester there shall be three sessional/internal tests. Pass mark is 40 percent i.e. 8 out of 20. Average of the best of the two marks shall be taken into account.



Results and progression:

- i. A candidate shall be declared as passed a course provided he/ she secures At least 35% marks in the course and 40% in aggregate in the end semester examinations. At least 40% marks in the Sessional/ Internal Examination is required in each subject.
- ii. A candidate shall be declared as passed a semester, provided he/ she pass all the courses of a semester independently both in internal and end semester examinations.
- iii. Average of the best two marks securedout of three sessional tests in each subject offered shall be sent to the university.
- iv. The marks in internal assessment obtained by the candidate shall be sent to the University for Declaration of the
- v. A candidate who fails or does not appear in one or more courses of any end semester exanimations shall be provisionally promoted to the next higher semester with the failed course as carried over course(s). Such candidates will be eligible to appear in the carried over course in the next regular examinations of those courses.
- vi. However, in order to move to a higher semester, a candidate must pass in at least two theory courses and all the practical courses with an aggregate of 40% marks in passed papers/ courses; as pass with back paper (PWBP) candidate.
- vii. A candidate shall be entitled to a maximum of three consecutive chances to clear a back paper; A candidate shall be allowed to get maximum two back papers in each semester.
- viii. If a candidate clears the sixth semester examination before clearing all the backlog courses of the previous semesters, the final result of the candidate shall be kept withheld until he/ she clears the backlog courses of the previous semesters.
- ix. A student must pass all his/ her semester examinations within Six Years, i.e., within 12 continuous semesters. In no circumstances this requirement shall be relaxed.
- x. Since the semester system involves continuous assessment, there shall be no scope for a student to appear as a private candidate in any programme in this system.
- xi. A candidate shall be declared to have passed the six semesters Degree B.A/ B.Sc/ B.Com programme provided he/ she has passed all the semesters and in all the courses separately securing an aggregate of at least 40% marks.

Rules for admission on transfer from other Colleges affiliated to Rajiv Gandhi University

- i. Ordinarily, the university shall not allow inter-college transfer. In a special circumstance, a candidate may be allowed to get admission on transfer from one College/Institution to other College/Institution affiliated to/ permitted by Rajiv Gandhi University on production of transfer certificate, proof of classes attended, migration certificate etc. not later than one month form the commencement of the classes of the semester concerned or the last date mentioned in the university academic calendar. The records of class attendance, performance in internal assessment in his/ her credit shall be carried over on admission and shall be computed for the purpose of examination.
- ii. No change in course combination shall be allowed with transfer from one College/ Institute to other.
- iii. A candidate shall have to apply for transfer in the prescribed format of the university along with prescribed fee.
- iv. A candidate may be allowed for college transfer only once during the whole programme.

COLLEGE DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE (CDC)

Strict discipline is to be maintained by each and every student in the college. The CDC shall deal with all the cases of indiscipline in strong hands. The Principal selects the members of CDC. The CDC deals very seriously with the cases of indiscipline like:-

- i) Irregularity in attendance, persistent idleness or negligence or indifference towards the work assigned.
- ii) Causing disturbance to a Class or the Office or the Library or Sports (Indoor or outdoor).
- iii) Misconduct or Misbehavior of any kind at the time of election to the Students Bodies or meeting or during curricular or Extra-Curricular Activities.
- iv) Misconduct and Misbehavior of any kind, towards a teacher or an employee of the College/University or another Institution or any member of Statutory Body of the University or any visitor to the College, University or another Institution.
- v) Causing damage to furniture or any other property of the College.
- vi) Eve teasing and ragging in any form.
- vii) Communal, divisive, separatist activities.
- viii) Any misconduct anywhere inside and outside the College Campus which is considered unbecoming of a student of the College.
- ix) Breach of Rules, Regulations as prescribed by the Government, University and the College from time to time.
- x) Inciting others to do any of the acts aforesaid.
- xi) Smoking or use of tobacco and its products, Gutkha, Alcoholic drinks, opium or in inebriated conditions in the college premises.
- xii) All the admitted students in the institution must wear the dress code as prescribed by the college authority. For boys, the dress code is light blue shirt and black long pant and for girls, light blue shirt and black long pant or pviama.

Note: The Principal of the College has the right to take action whenever there is a breach of discipline.

PROHIBITION OF RAGGING

As per Govt. Order No. ED/HE-301/2008/120, Dtd. 22.04.2009 and the directives of the Honourable Supreme Court, any behavior or act that may come under the definition of ragging will be viewed with extreme gravity and will invite exemplary punishment as deemed fit by the authority.

Depending upon the nature and gravity of the offence, as established by the Anti-Ragging Committee of the institution, the possible punishments for those found guilty of ragging at the institution level shall be any one or any combination of the following:

- Cancellation of admission.
- Suspension from attending classes.
- Withholding / withdrawing scholarship / fellowship and other benefits.
- Debarring from appearing in any test / examination or other evaluation process.
- Withholding results.
- Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.
- Suspension / expulsion from the hostel.
- Rustication from the institution for a period ranging from 1 to 4 semesters.
- Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution.
- ♦ Fine of Rupees 25.000/-.
- ♦ Collective punishment: When the persons committing or abetting the crime of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment as a deterrent to ensure community pressure on the potential raggers.
- ♦ The students are to intimate, in case of any ragging incident takes place, to the Advisor, Students' Union or to any Faculty Member of the College or take the help of the Nation-wide Anti-Ragging Helpline No. 1800-180-5522.
- Further, it is compulsory for all the students to fill up the online anti ragging undertaking on www.amanmovement.org or <a h

ANTI RAGGING COMMITTEE & SQUAD

The Anti Ragging Committee is formed to check and prohibit the ragging activities in the institution. If any student is found guilty of practicing ragging in any manners would be punished as per the above clauses.

IMPORTANT RULES FOR THE STUDENTS

- 1. No Departmental fresher meet/farewell is to be entertained from the Academic session 2025-26 onwards except General induction/farewell which is to be organized by college authority.
- No community cultural/games/literary activities are to be entertained in auditorium/college campus from the academic session 2025-26 onwards.
- 3. Auditorium coul<mark>d be utiliz</mark>ed for college related activities like cultural/ games/ literary during the session.
- 4. If at all the college auditorium is provided to any student groups/any group then a consolidated amount of `5000/- is to be given in the form of Hall charges/rent.

STUDENTS' UNION

The college has got its Students' Union, known as "Indira Gandhi Government College Students Union" (IGGCSU). It is an active body which works for the welfare of students of the college. The students' union becomes a training ground for students to learn about democratic values, effective political participation and future leadership. It strives to raise students' grievances, extend support for creating healthy academic atmosphere and articulate issues of 'student welfare' without interference in the day to day administration and policy matters of the College as framed by the Govt. of Arunachal Pradesh.

After the introduction of the semester system, the academic span has been reduced to six months instead of twelve months. Therefore some changes have become inevitable regarding the holding/continuance of the office bearers of the students union. If any office bearer of the students' union fails to clear the odd semester (1st, 3rd and 5th) examinations, he or she shall cease to hold/ continue in office as he or she shall not remain a regular student of the college. In such case, the respective Assistant Secretaries shall take over for the rest of the period. If both of them fail to clear the said examinations, the Ex-officio chairperson (Principal) shall select or co-opt someone either from the existing students' union or someone from amongst the regular students exercising his discretion.

All the *bonafide* students of the college constitute the general body. They elect/select from amongst themselves the following office bearers of the union, through secret ballot/unanimous selection, to carry out the day to day activities of the union.

The student union election is strictly conducted on the basis of Lyngdoh Committee recommendations as upheld by Hon'ble Supreme Court of India. The College Authority appoints Returning Officer to conduct the election and impartial observers to oversee the same.

The tenure of the office bearers expires as soon as they fill up End Semester Examination Forms for University Examinations in the month of April and all union activities ceases except for predetermined time bound programme like farewell to Final year students. The office bearers are subjected to rules of discipline as prescribed by the college. They are required to discharge their functions under the guidance and supervision of Union Advisor and other Advisors. The concerned secretaries will consult and obtain written permission from the respective advisors before commencement of any Extra Curricular activities.

The Union Advisor is the custodian of Student Union funds. The office bearers will request / propose in writing to the Union Advisor/Respective Advisors for student / union related activities. The Principal shall release the fund only after duly recommended by the concern advisors, the Union Advisor will make necessary expenditure out of Student Union funds and maintain codal formalities and office bearers will assist him in this regard. It may be noted that the student office bearers will not be allowed to handle the cash directly.

SALIENT FEATURES OF THE LYNGDOH COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Where the atmosphere of the university, campus is, adverse to the conduct of peaceful, free and fair elections, the university, its constituent colleges and departments must initiate a system of student representation based on nominations, especially where elections are being held at present.
- 2. Undergraduate students between the ages of 17 and 22 may contest elections.
- 3. The candidate should in no event have any academic arrears in the year of contesting the election.
- 4. The candidate should have attained the minimum percentage of attendance as prescribed by the university or 75% attendance whichever is higher.
- 5. The candidate shallnot have a previous criminal record, that is to sayhe should not have been tried and/or convicted of any criminal offence or misdemeanor. The candidate shallalso not have been subject to any disciplinary action by the University authorities.
- 6. The candidate must be a regular, full time student of the college/university and should not be a distance/proximate education student. That is to say that all eligible candidates must be enrolled in a full time course, the course duration being at least one year.
- 7. The maximum permitted expenditure per candidate shall be Rs. 5000/- (Rupees Five Thousand only).
- 8. The election of the candidate will be nullified in the event of any non-compliance or in the event of any excessive expenditure.
- 9. Criticism of other candidates, when made, shall be confined to their policies and programs, past record and work. Candidates shall refrain from criticism of all aspects of private life, not connected with the public activities of the other candidates or supporters of such other candidates. Criticism of other candidate, or their supporters based on unverified allegation or distortions hall be avoided.
- 10. There shall be no appeal to caste or communal feelings for securing votes. Places of worship, within or without the campus shall not be used for election propaganda.
- 11. All candidates shall be prohibited from indulging or abetting, all activities which are considered to be "corrupt practices" and offences, such as bribing of votes, intimidation of voters, and impersonation of voters canvassing or the use of propaganda within 100 meters of polling stations.
- 12. No candidate shall be permitted to make use of printed posters, printed pamphlets or any other printed material for the purpose of canvassing. Candidates may only utilize hand-made poster for the purpose of canvassing.
- 13. No candidate shall be permitted to carry out procession or public meeting, or in any way canvas or distribute propaganda outside the college.
- 14. No candidates or his/her supporters deface or cause any destruction to any property of the college campus, for any purpose whatsoever.
- 15. The use of loudspeakers, vehicles and animals for the purpose of the canvassing shall be prohibited.
- 16. On the day of the polling, student's organisation and candidates shall-
 - Co-operate with the officers on election duty, ensure peaceful and orderly polling and complete freedom to the voters to exercise their franchise without being subjected to any annoyance or obstructions;
 - ii) Not serve or distribute any eatables or other solid and liquid consumable, except water on polling day;
 - iii) Not hand out any propaganda on the polling day.
- 17. Excepting the voters, no one without a valid pass/letters of authority from the election commission or from the college authority shall enter the polling booths.

- 18. Any contravention of any of the above recommendations may make the candidate liable to be stripped of his candidature, or his elected post, as the case may be. The election commission/college authorities may also take appropriate disciplinary action against such violator.
- 19. In addition to the above mentioned code of conduct, it is also recommended that certain provisions of the Indian Penal Code, 1860 (section 153 A and chapter IX A-"Offences Relating to Election"), may also be made applicable to student elections.

GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL MECHANISM

There is a GrievanceRedressal Cell with the Dean (Student Welfare)/Teacher in charge of students' affairs as its chairman. In addition, one senior faculty member, one senior Administrator Officer and two final year students –one boy and one girl (till the election results declares, students can be nominated on the basis of merit and/or participation in the co-curricular activities in the previous year). The Grievance cell shall be mandated with the Redressal of election related grievances, including, but not limited to breaches of the code of conduct of elections and complaints relating to election related expenditure. This cell would be the regular unit of the institution.

FACILITIES FOR THE STUDENTS

The College always strives to offer optimum facilities to the students out of its limited resources. Students are to use these facilities judiciously and properly without giving any scope for misuse or wastage.

HOSTEL FACILITY

The College has three hostels meant for APST students' belonging to the Catchment areas - Lohit, Anjaw, Namsai Districts. The students belonging to the Catchment areas are given first preference in Hostel accommodation subject to the availability of seats strictly on the basis of merit. However, students from neighboring districts, viz., Lower Dibang Valley, Dibang Valley, Tirap, Longding and Changlang may seek admission as per the Catchment area norm. Two hostels are for the girls with a capacity of 98 seats and one hostel is meant for boys, with a total capacity of 72 seats. The Hostel seats are allotted on the basis of merit as per the government's directive. Out of the total hostel seats, 25%, 35% & 40% will be distributed among 1st, 3rd & 5th Semester students (both boys & girls) respectively.

i) Hostel Admission Procedure

Desirous students are to apply for hostel seats on prescribed form which are available with hostel superintendent. They are to submit the following Documents:

- Mark sheet of the Qualifying Exam. One Attested copy.
- 2. Photo 2 copies.
- 3. ST certificate One Attested copy.
- The Hostel Undertaking form duly signed by the student himself/herself.

ii) Hostel Management

The general management of each Hostel is looked after by Hostel Superintendent, appointed by the college authority from among the Faculty Members. A Prefect is elected / selected from among the Boarders of the Hostel who liaisons between Hostel Superintendent and Boarders. A Hostel Disciplinary Committee is also constituted with the boarders to deal with issues related to the discipline of the Hostel.

iii) Hostel Rules

- 1. A student who is admitted to the college cannot claim hostel seat as a matter of right.
- Seats allotted must be occupied within 15 days from the date of allotment. If the seat is not occupied timely and no
 intimation is given to the Hostel Superintendent, the seats will be forfeited and allotted to other students on the basis of
 merit.
- 3. There will be no proxy admission in any hostel.
- 4. The boarders should not allow outsiders to stay in the hostel. If, due to unavoidable reasons, a boarder has to accommodate a guest temporarily, prior permission is required from the Hostel Superintendent.
- 5. Entering of male members into Girls' Hostel and female members into Boys' Hostel is not permitted after 5 pm every day. Gate of Girls hostel is closed at 6 pm.
- The Boarders are to keep their rooms and surroundings neat, clean and tidy by doing Social Service at least once in a
 week. They should not indulge in damaging the hostel buildings, furniture and other government properties. Violation of
 rules will invite penalty from the authority.
- 7. The use of loud speaker/high volume stereo etc., in the hostel is prohibited. No boarder shall play Music System or Radio set during study and Night hours.
- 8. The use of personal/ private heater, cylinder, etc. in the hostel is strictly prohibited.

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- 9. Boarders shall seek written permission from the Hostel Superintendent whenever they leave the hostel. Boarders leaving the Hostel in mid-session without the consent and permission of the Hostel Superintendent will forfeit his claim over his caution money and such students will not be admitted in the hostel in future year.
- 10. The Boarders must maintain decency, decorum and discipline in and around the Hostel premises. Violation of discipline, rules and regulations will lead to expulsion from the Hostels.
- 11. All the fans and lights must be switched-off when they (lights and fans) are not required or when the boarders go outside their rooms.
- 12. Rooms must be vacated during Winter Recess and Summer Vacation by handing over all the articles of the Hostel Rooms to the concerned Hostel Superintendent. The College authority cannot provide adequate security to the personal belongings of the Hostel Boarders and so this is to be looked after by the boarders themselves.
- 13. Hostel boarders are to join the common mess of the hostel compulsorily and no separate mess/cooking is allowed.

STIPEND AND BOOK GRANT

All APST students are entitled to receive Stipend subject to the scrutiny of their monthly attendance by the Attendance Monitoring Cell of the Directorate of Higher & Technical Education, Government of Arunachal Pradesh.

Conditions for Grant of Stipend -

- The grant of stipend depends upon the satisfactory progress and good conduct of the students.
- The Government shall have the inherent right to cancel the stipend wholly or partly or stop or withhold further payment for any reason which the Government thinks proper.
- If a student is found to have obtained stipend by false means, the stipend paid will be recovered and such students will be black listed and debarred from getting under any scheme forever.
- The stipend awarded may be cancelled if a student changes the subject of the course of study for which the stipend was originally awarded or changes the institution of study without the prior approval of the Government of Arunachal Pradesh.
- A stipendiary shall cease to draw stipend as and when he gets a government job.
- Disbursement of stipend will be subject to regular attendance in the college. At least 75% classes must be attended in every month so as to get the stipend for the month.
- Stipend amount will be credited only in the bank account of the students.
- It is compulsory to open their personal Bank Account in any bank and it must be linked to their AADHAR ID.
- The Students need to have an email id and phone number to apply for scholarship/stipend in National Scholarship Portal, which will be opened after the notification in nsp.gov.in.

PRINCIPAL'S AWARD

The Principal's award has been instituted from the academic session 2016-17. Three awards shall be given to the toppers of each stream B.A, B.Sc and B.Com after their VI Semester Exam. The award will carry a cash prize of 2000 each with a certificate. In addition to it, the Principal's award for the best Office Staff which is given on 26th January of every year with cash prize of Rs. 2000 along with a certificate.

NAAC & IQAC

NAAC & IQAC have been revamped to work positively and effectively to reach the needs of the students and teachers of our college. In its second cycle of reaccreditation, the college is awarded with B++ Grade during 2016. The third Cycle NAAC Reaccreditation has been recently completed in the year 2024 and the college is Awarded with "B" Grade.

The College has one academic cell, for the newly introduced Four Year Degree Course (NEP 2020) & Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) for smooth conduct of admission and examination process and to provide necessary academic guidance as and when needed.

LIBRARY FACILITY
